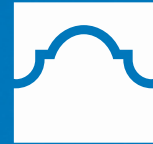

Saint Bowden's Feast Day Celebration

"Realize that you are working for yourself and demand the best that you can give to yourself. If necessary, work 10 to 12 hours a day in class and in preparation. You will not get brain fever" – Artemisia Bowden



Dr. Bowden's Life of Service

Dr. Artemisia Bowden died this week. She was 90 years old, the last 67 of the years were lived here. She was a Georgia-born black girl whose intelligent mind and sensitive soul put her in the forefront of efforts to raise the educational level of her community in an era when not much was being done about that work.

As a sharp and telling commentary on the times and her own foresight, she became principal of St. Philip's Normal and Industrial School (later to become St. Philip's College) at age 18—without a degree.

She pursued formal education with a quiet zeal that was to mark her work here for many years. She retired in 1954 with a backlog of achievement that made her the pride of those who

The National Urban League is the only national service organization devoted to increasing the economic opportunities of Negroes through the instrumentality of interracial co-operation.

The certificate was sent to Mrs. Mayne S. Hastings, president of the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, of which Miss Bowden is a member. Because there is no local chapter of the league in San Antonio, Mrs. Hastings made the award to Miss Bowden.

St. Philip's Dean to Be Honored at Open House

An open house honoring Dr. Artemisia Bowden, dean of St. Philip's Junior College, will be held from 5 to 7 p.m. Sunday at her residence, 2101 Dakota St.

Her half-century of leadership at the Negro college began in 1905 when the Episcopal diocese opened a girls' school. The "Saturday Evening School for Girls" grew by 1927 in a \$75,000 co-educational institution with expansion of the curriculum from primary and grammar to normal school with domestic arts and sciences.

In 1927 St. Philip's entered its second era when it became a Junior college. Dr. Bowden traveled and made speeches and generally spearheaded growth of the school.

Third period of growth, as considered by Dr. Bowden, is the transfer from a private school to a public community college in the fall of 1952. She now is looking forward to the biggest expansion project in the school's history, which not only will enlarge the campus on Dakota Street but provide modern buildings.

Among her many citations as an educator is a scroll of honor for outstanding work on Negro education in Texas presented by the National Council of Negro Women, Inc.; a "Good Neighbor" award from the Council of Pan-American

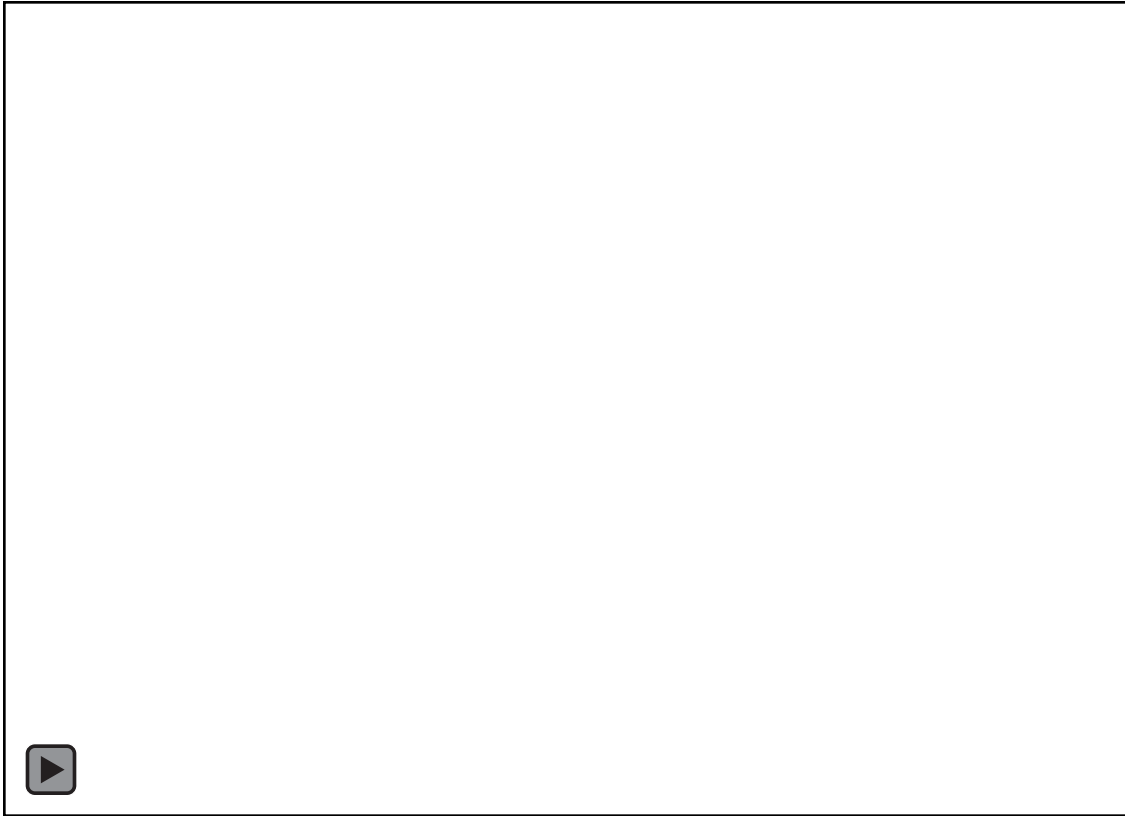
relations for influence on youth.

The National Urban League presented her a certificate of recognition in 1950 for achievements in Negro social services. In 1948 she was honored during Negro History Week and was named one of the 12 outstanding women that year, along with Marian Anderson, for organizing the Negro Business and Professional Woman's Club.

The highest honor of her career came in her 47th year of educational work when Thurgood Marshall, Miss Bowden's reformer and strongman.

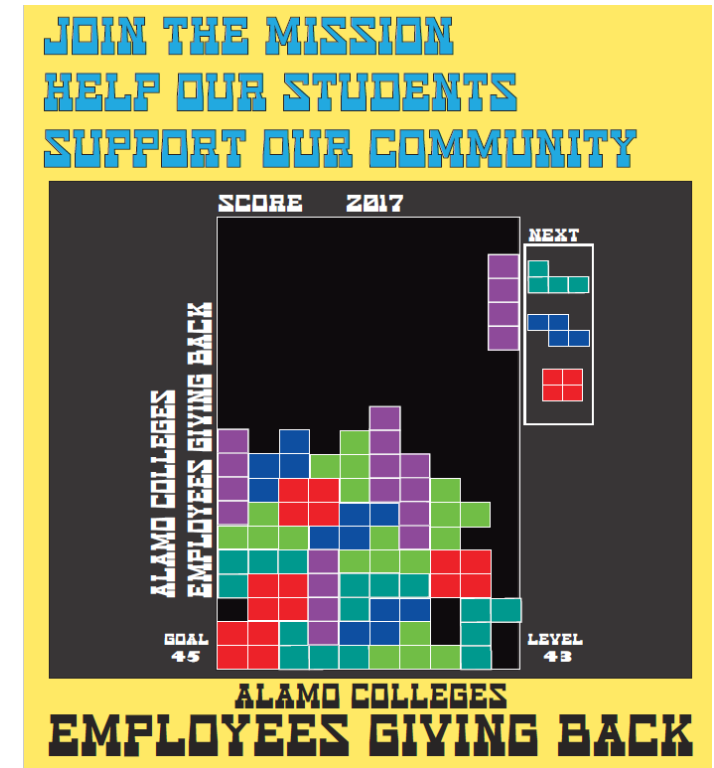

Case Study: The Cheater

During an ethics class, a professor leads a discussion on the St. Philip's College QEP and about how students are constantly required to make ethical decisions about their academic work.

After class, one of the students approaches the professor and states that he could really relate to the topic of the class today, as he had personally been under a lot of pressure in the previous semester and had made some bad choices. "I had a science project due, and I had gotten behind in my work. The deadline was then upon me, and I didn't want to fail. So, I falsified the data for my project."



Case Study: The Cheater

The professor is surprised by this admission, and by the student's casual mentioning of this serious academic transgression to him. The student continues that he really blames his previous instructor for "not catching him" which "really is his job" so he believes he deserves the "A" grade he received in the class. In the middle of this confession, another professor enters the room, and the student continues discussing what he did without any sense of embarrassment or remorse.

When he leaves the room, the two professors discuss the situation they are now in because of this confession.



Case Study: Real-to-Life Examples of Complex Ethical Dilemmas

- Is there an obligation to report the cheating, even though the student did not cheat in the professor's class?



Process of Ethical Decision-Making

1. Stop and think to determine the facts
2. Identify options
3. Consider consequences for yourself and others
4. Make an ethical choice and take appropriate action

Process of Ethical Decision-Making

1. Determine the facts

- Instructor reinforced ethical decision making
- Student acknowledged that he made a bad choice
- Student falsified data on a project
- Faculty review of the data is questionable
- Student blamed instructor for not catching his falsification
- Student openly telegraphs his cheating
- Faculty openly discusses their dilemma

Process of Ethical Decision-Making

2. Identify options

- Notify the instructor of student cheating
- Notify judicial officer if there is an institutional policy on cheating
- Notify the student that you will be paying particular attention to all work that he submits
- Reinforce the elements of ethical decision making

Process of Ethical Decision-Making

3. Consider consequences for yourself and others

- Student feels that he can celebrate and boast about his strategy for how he addressed a schedule challenge
- Student devalues the role of the instructor
- Student lacks a moral compass
- Current instructors become willing collaborators if no action is taken

Process of Ethical Decision-Making

4. Make an ethical choice

- Notify the instructor that the student cheated in his class
- Advise student that you have no appreciation for his devaluing the instructor position
- Advise student that he has an obligation to inform his instructor of his actions and even if he does not, you will within the week
- Refer student to counseling/support services in dealing with schedule challenges

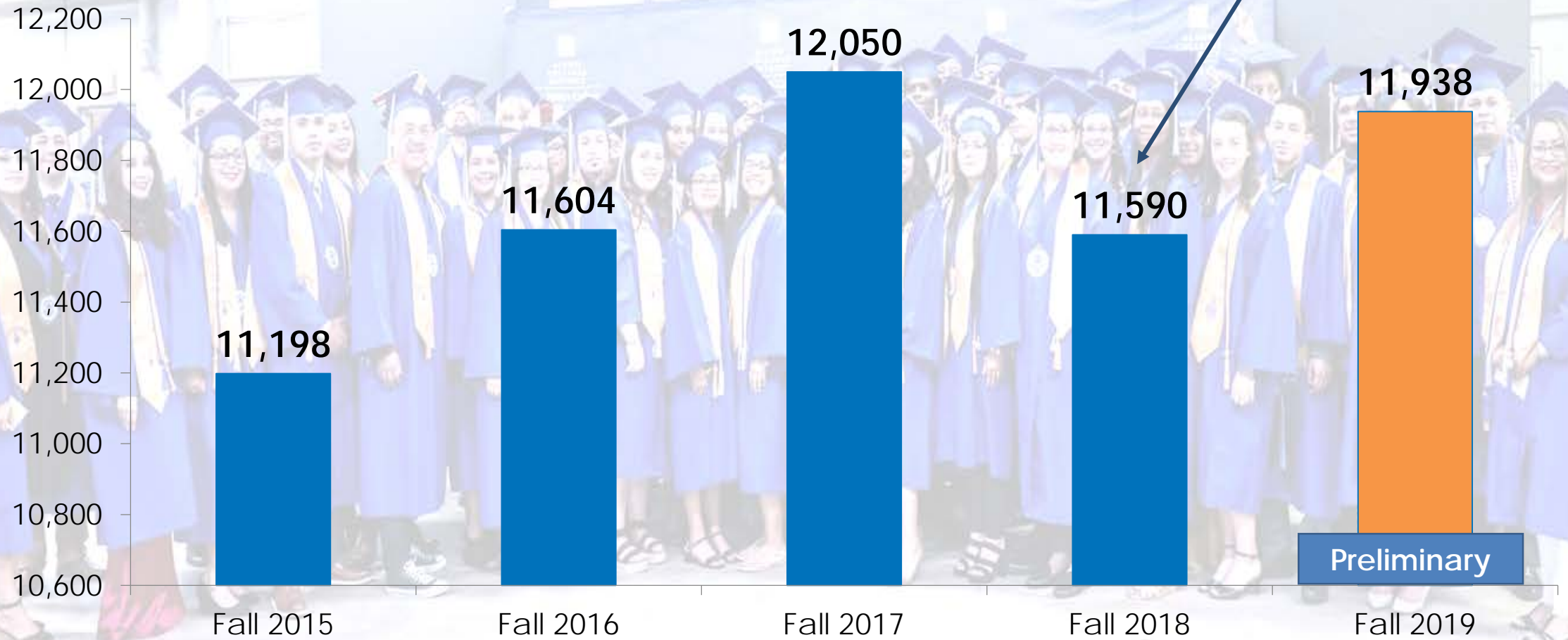

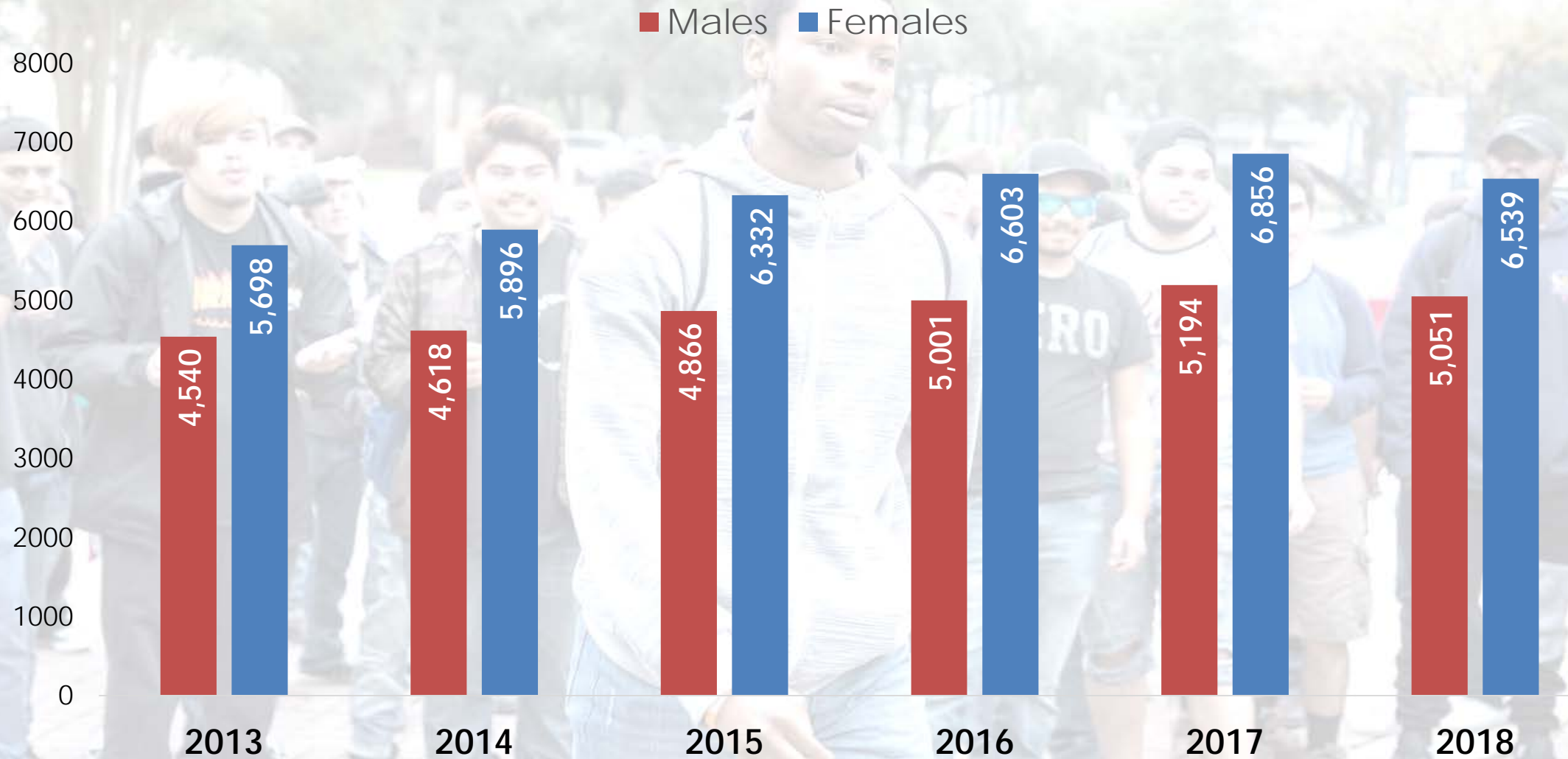


Fall Headcount Enrollment

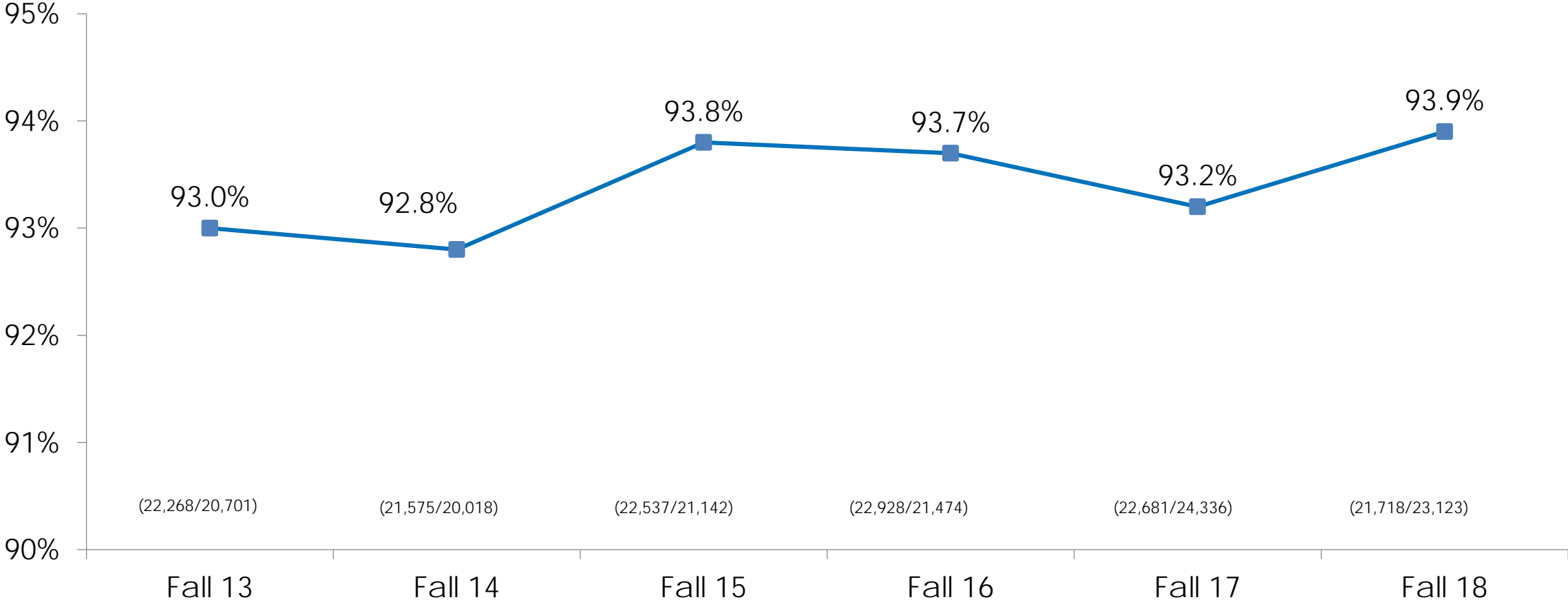
Fall Enrollment Gender Comparison

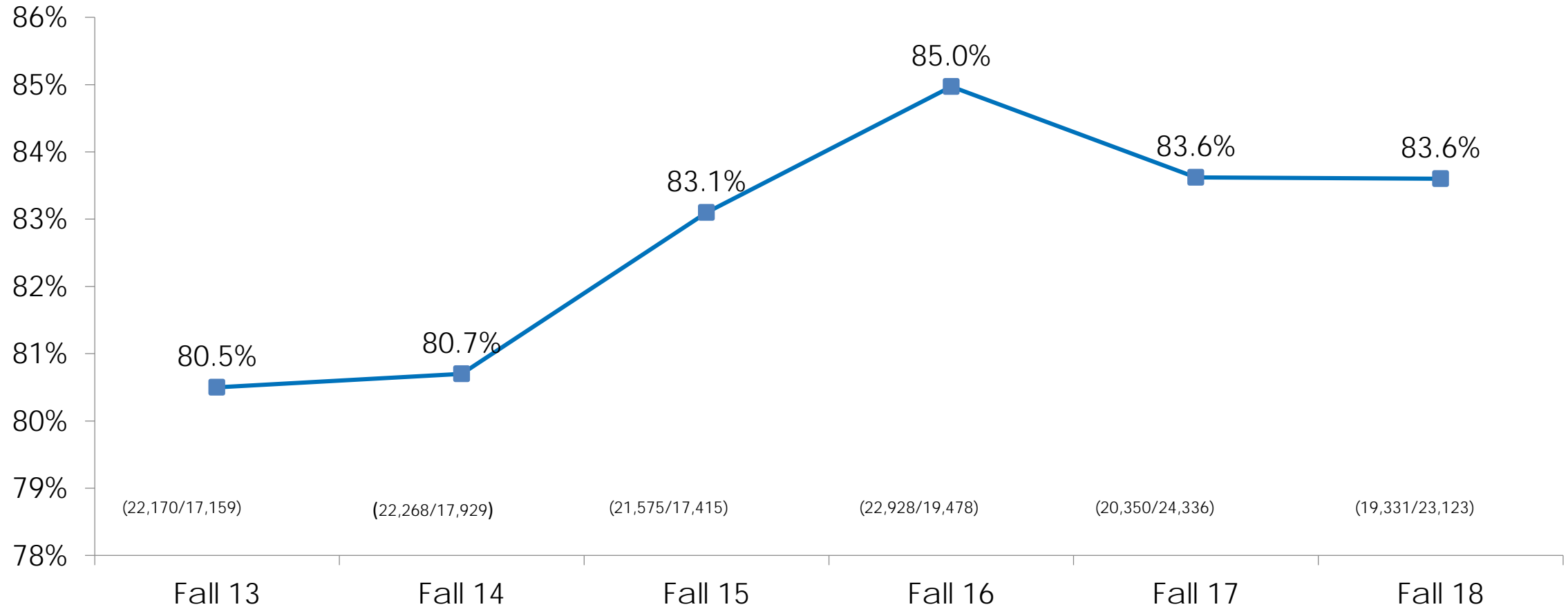

Productive Grade Rates

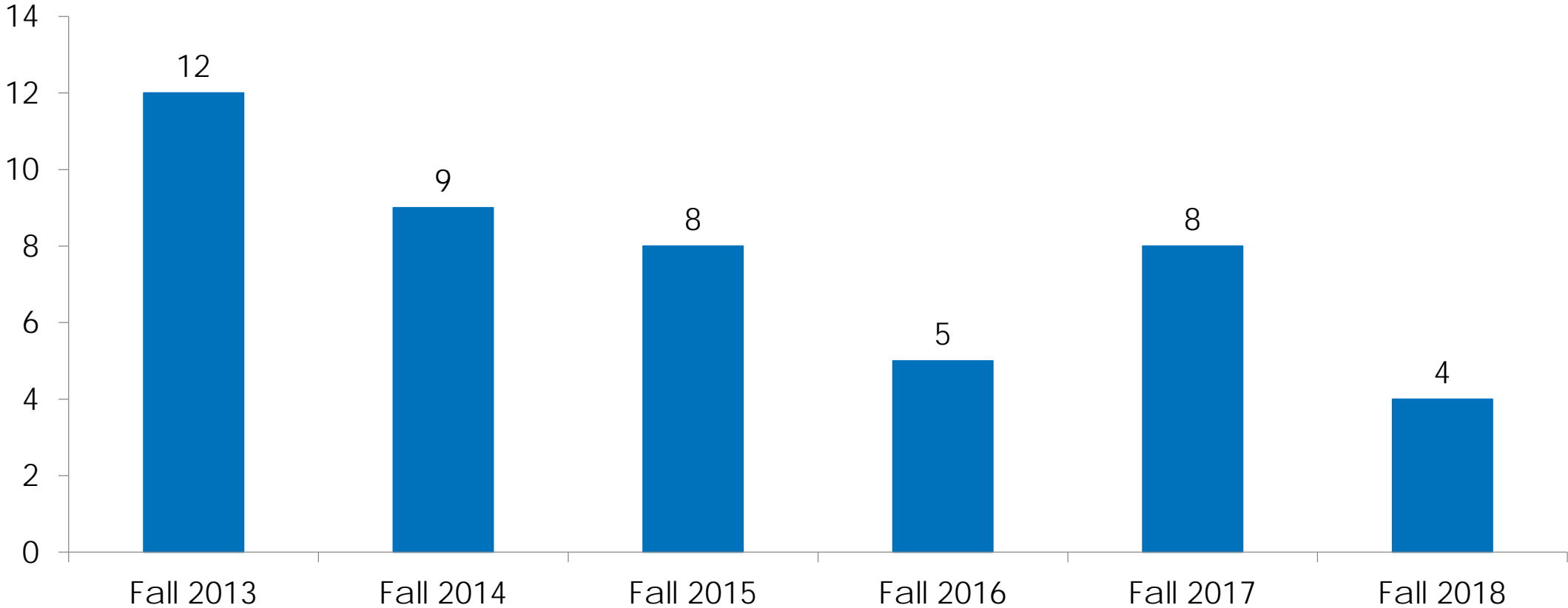

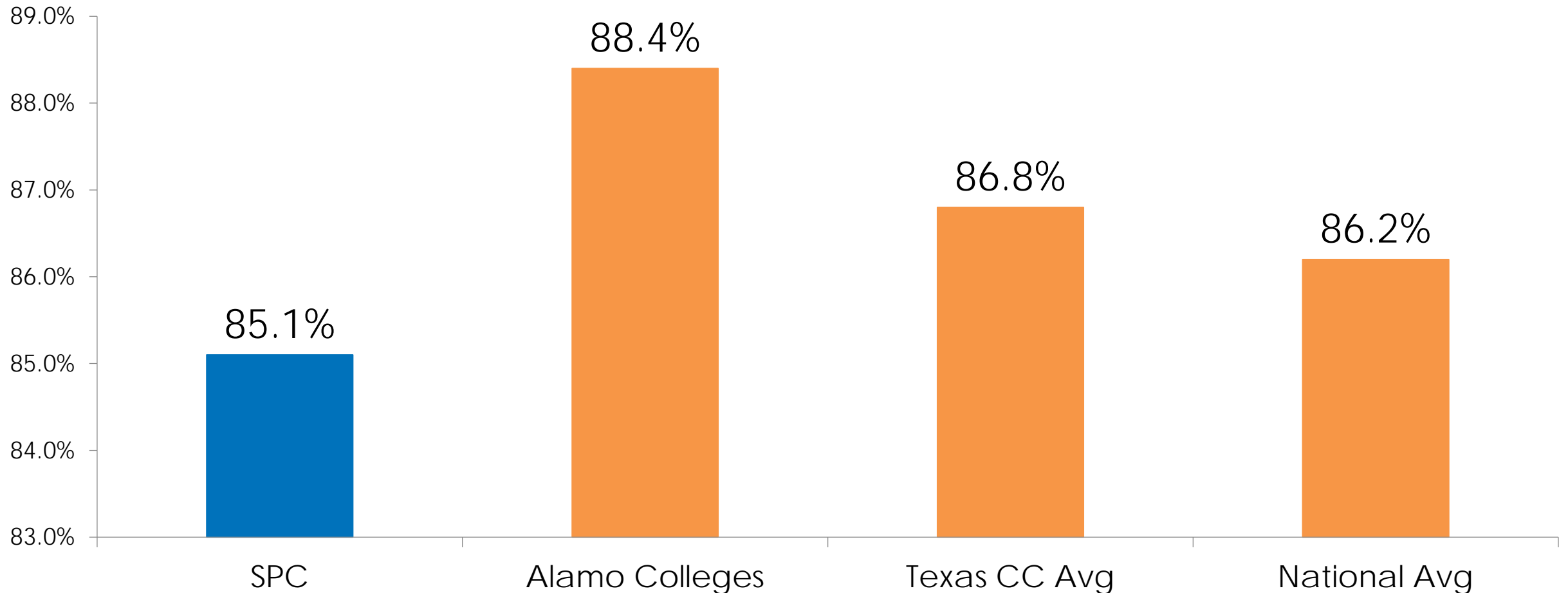

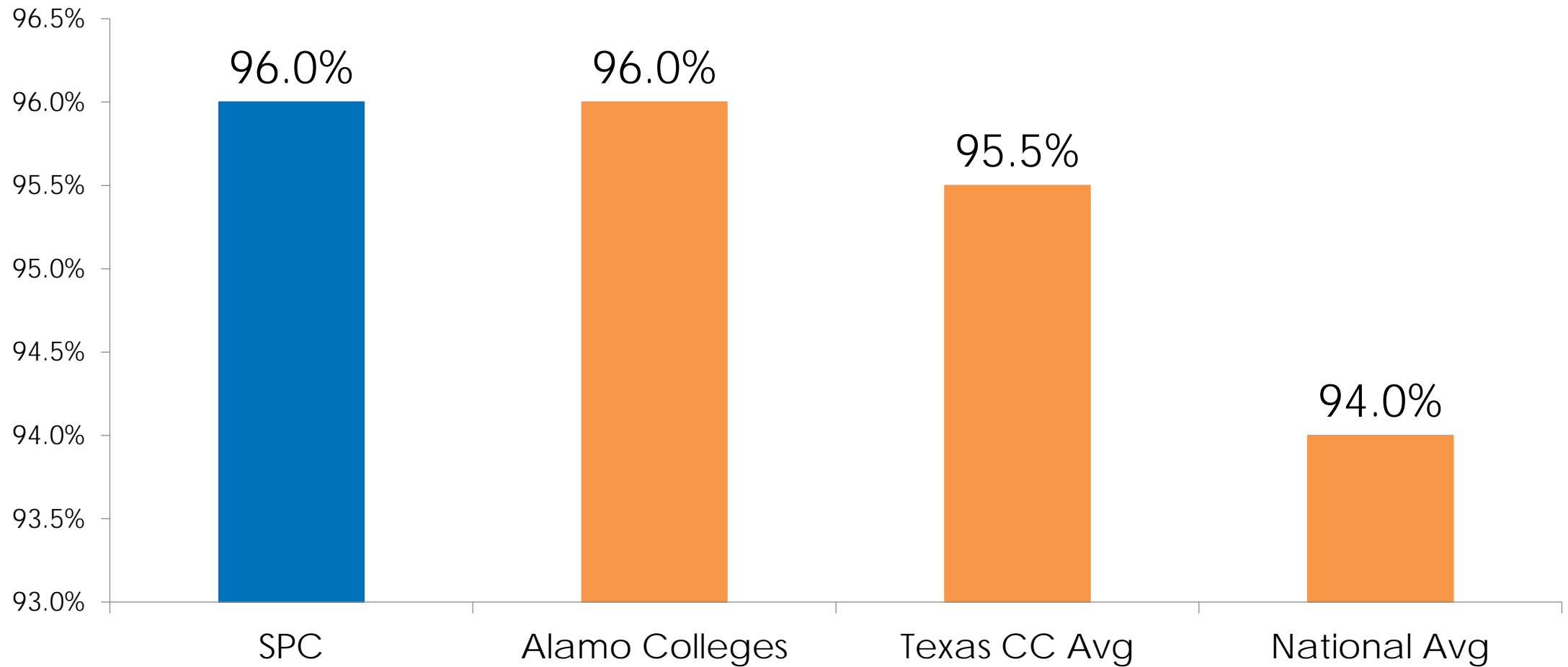

Percentage of Students Rating their Entire Educational Experience as "Good or Excellent"



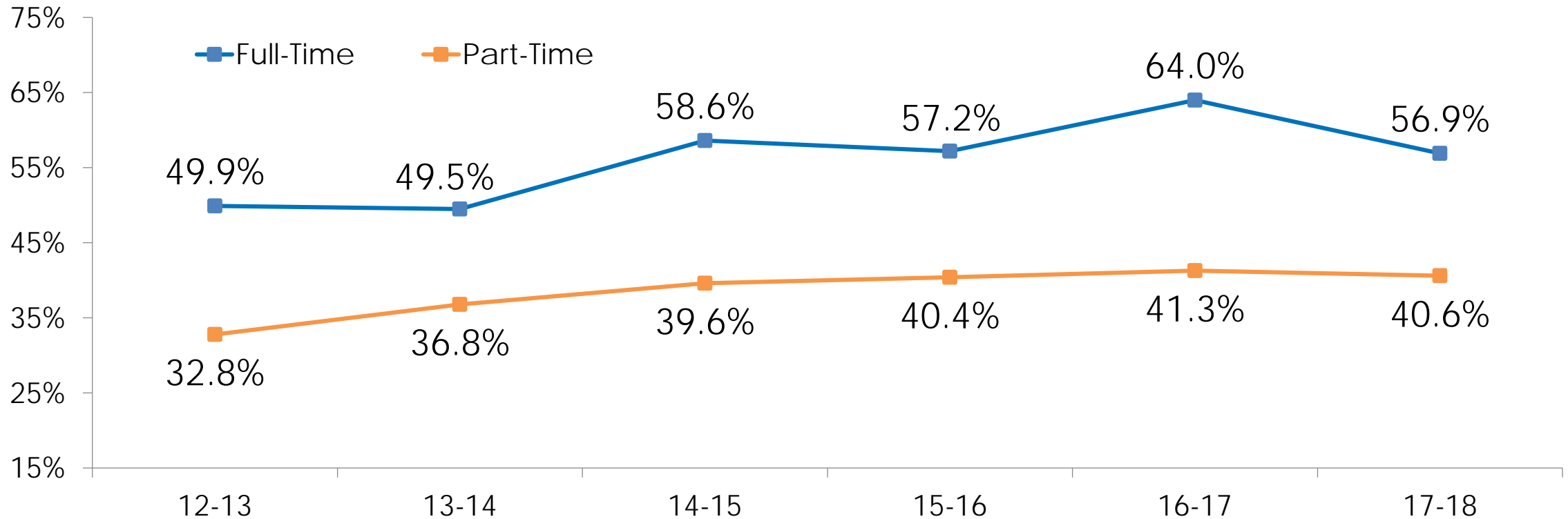

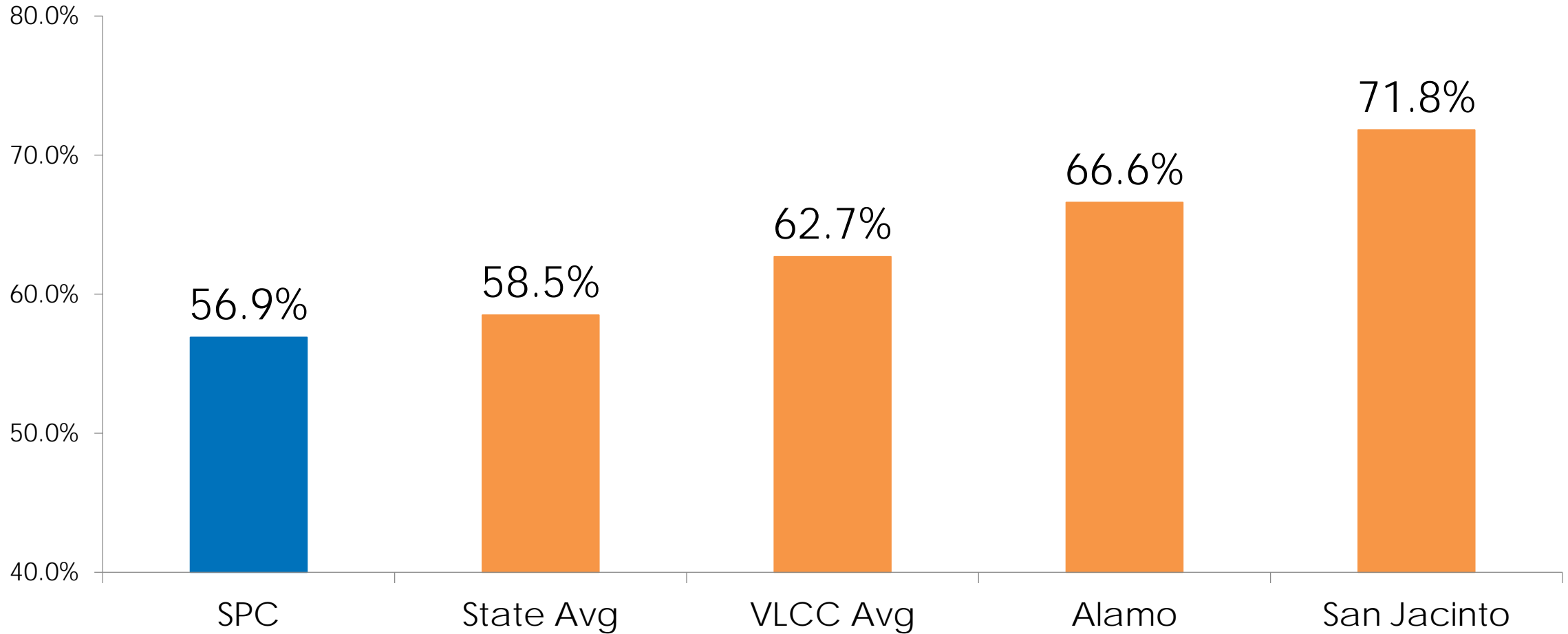

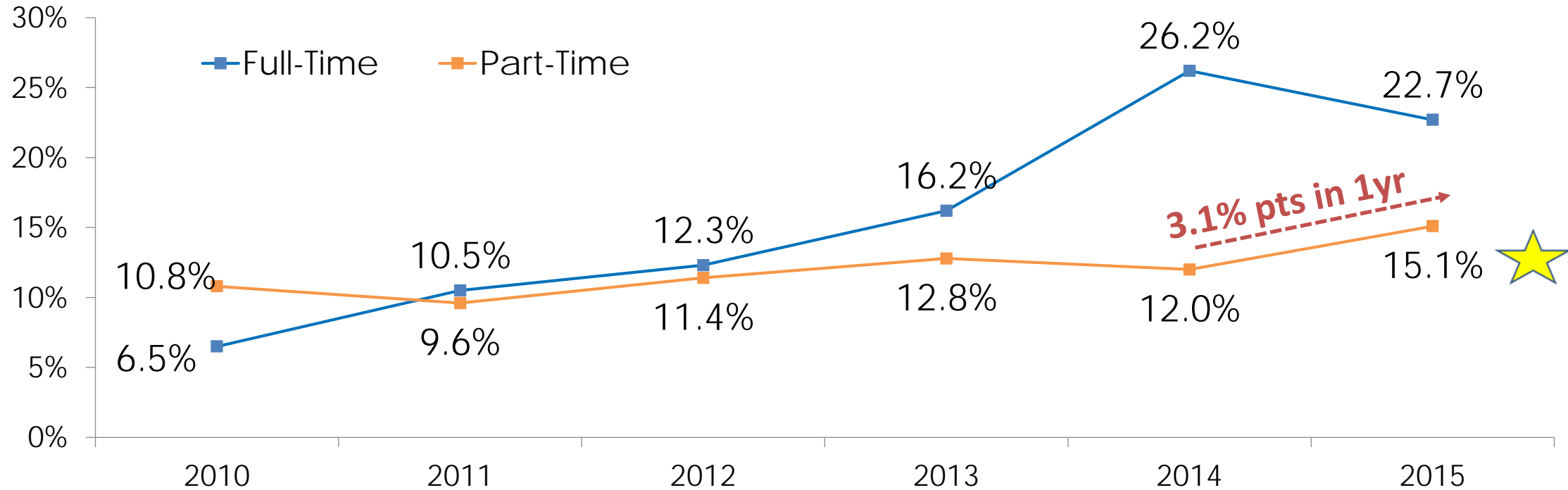

FT FTIC Comparative Persistence Rates



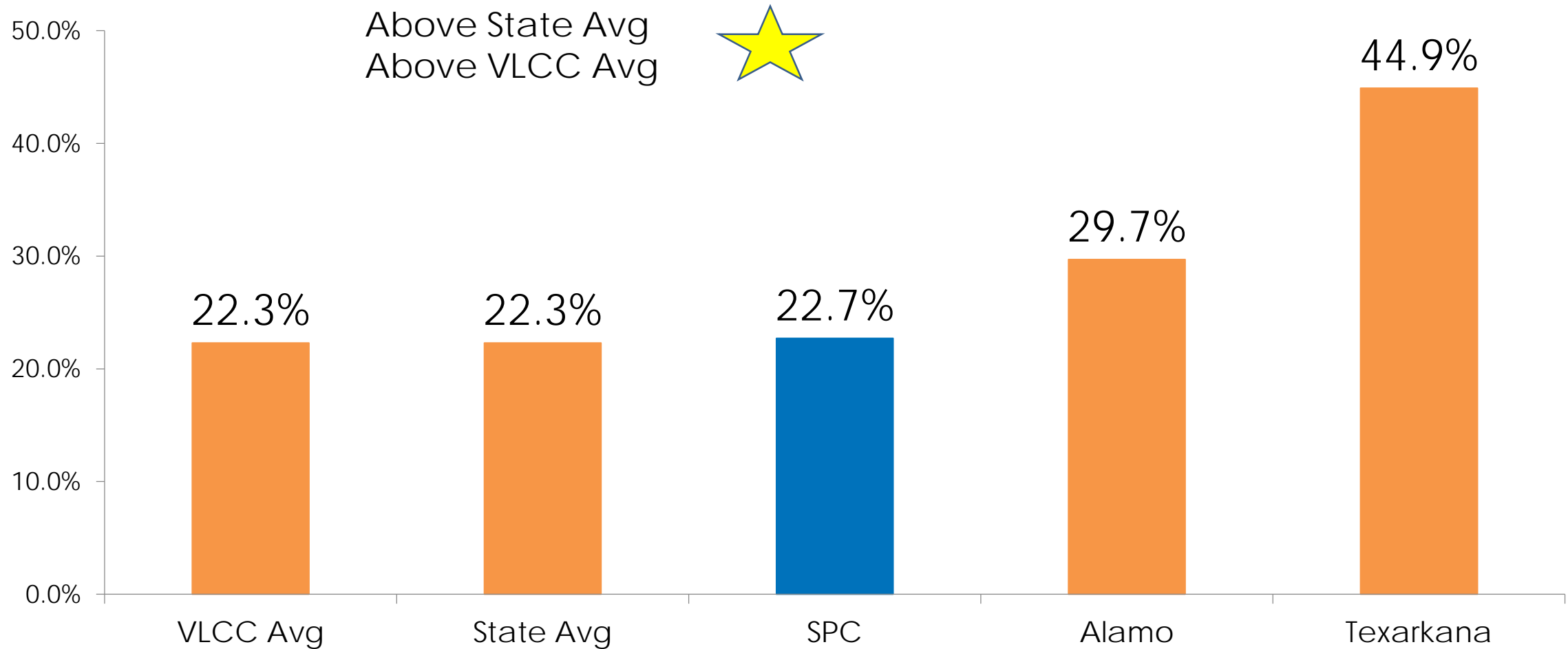

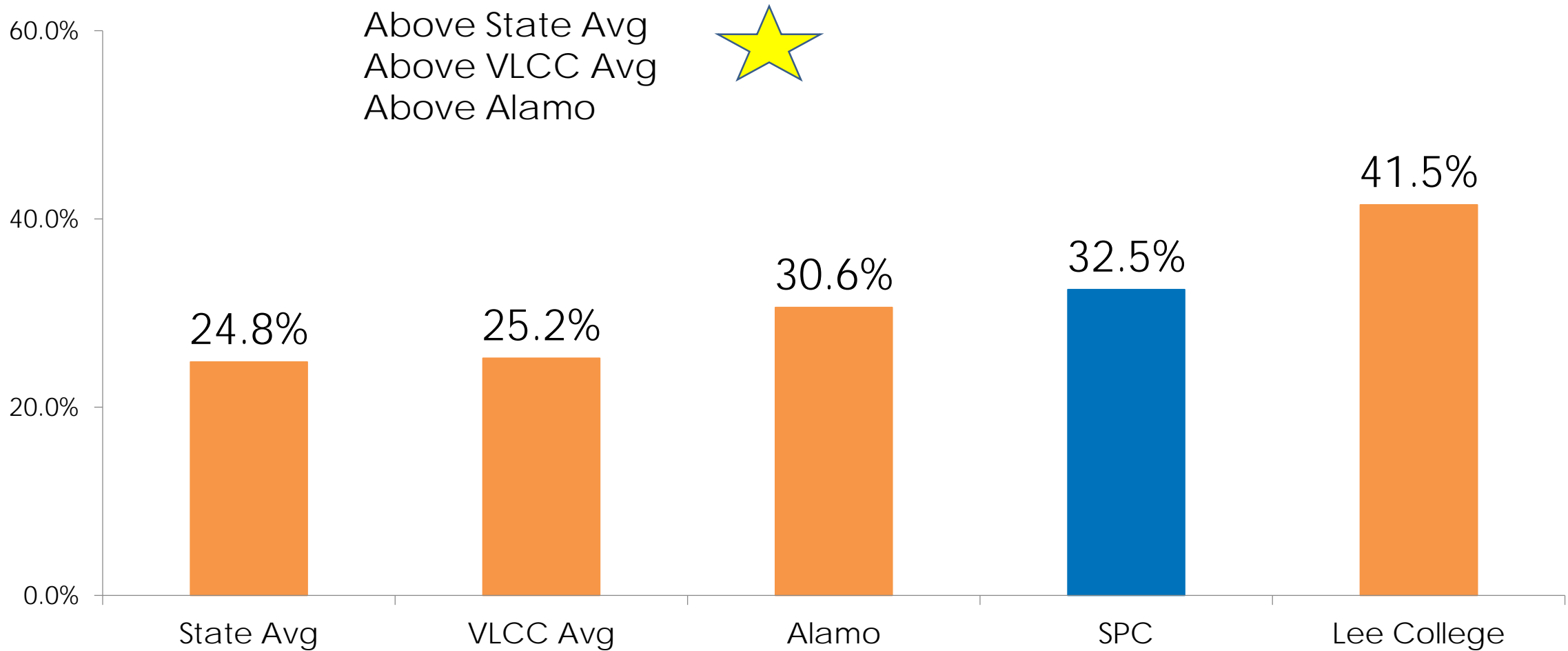

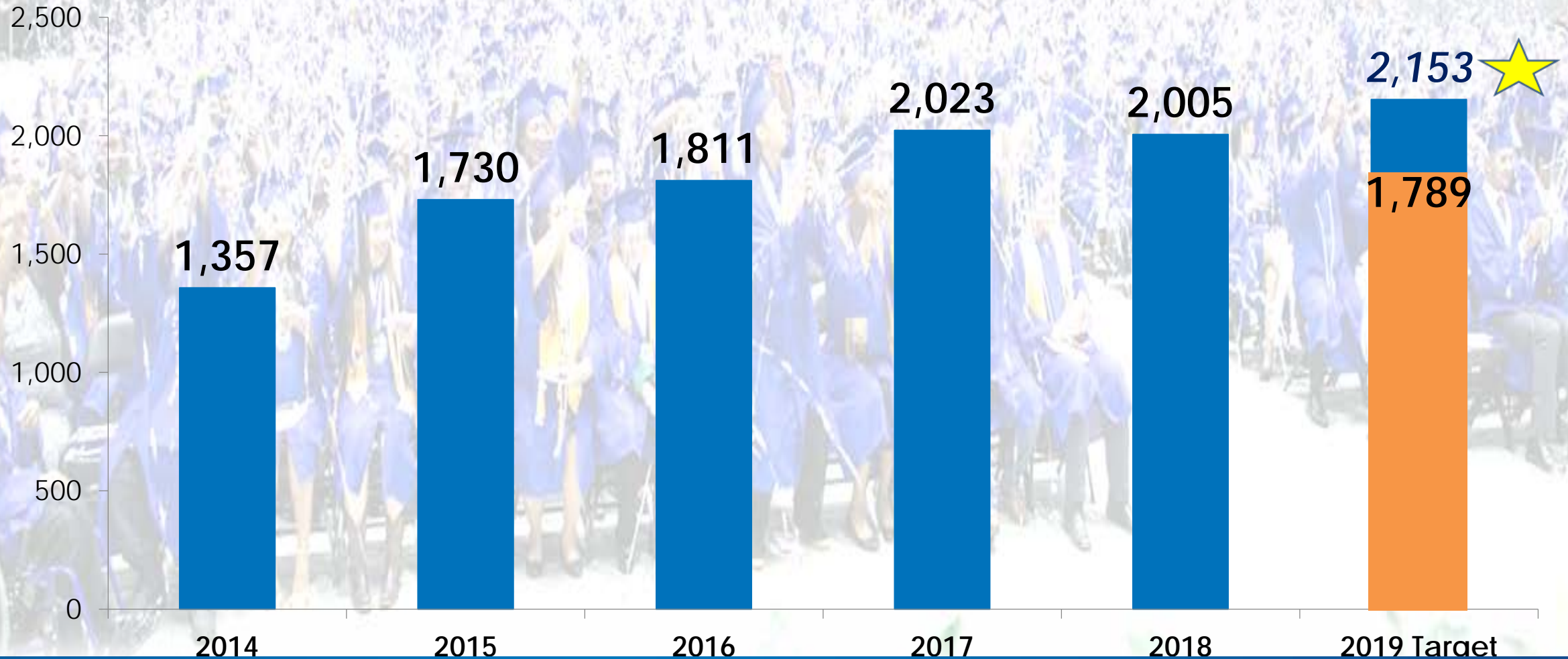

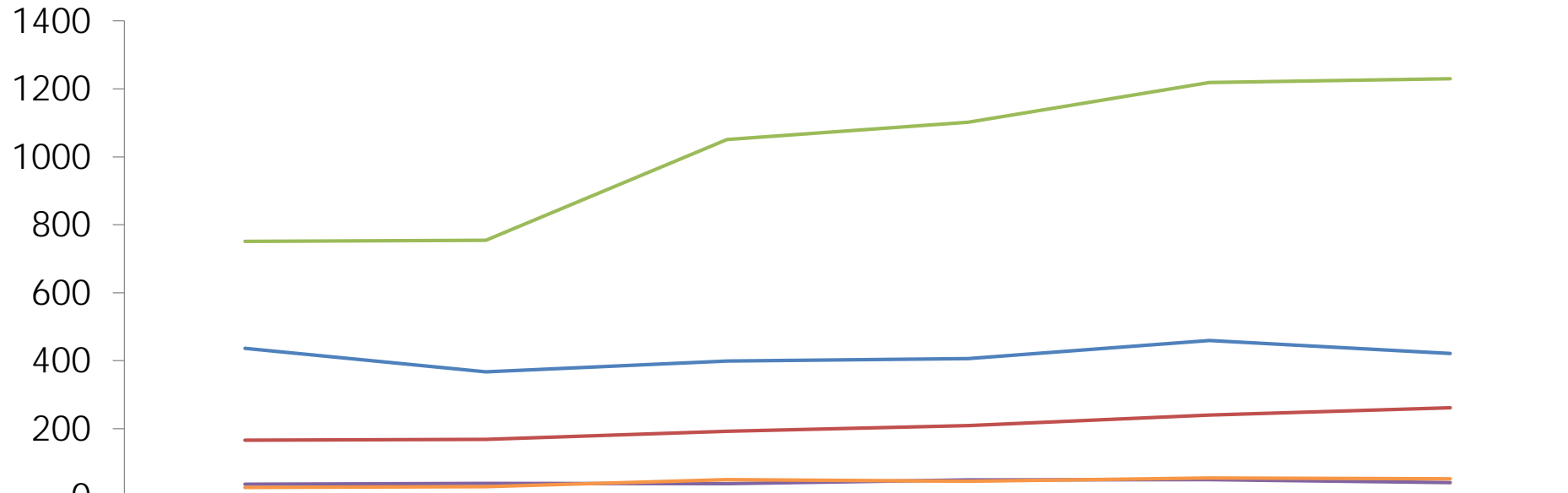

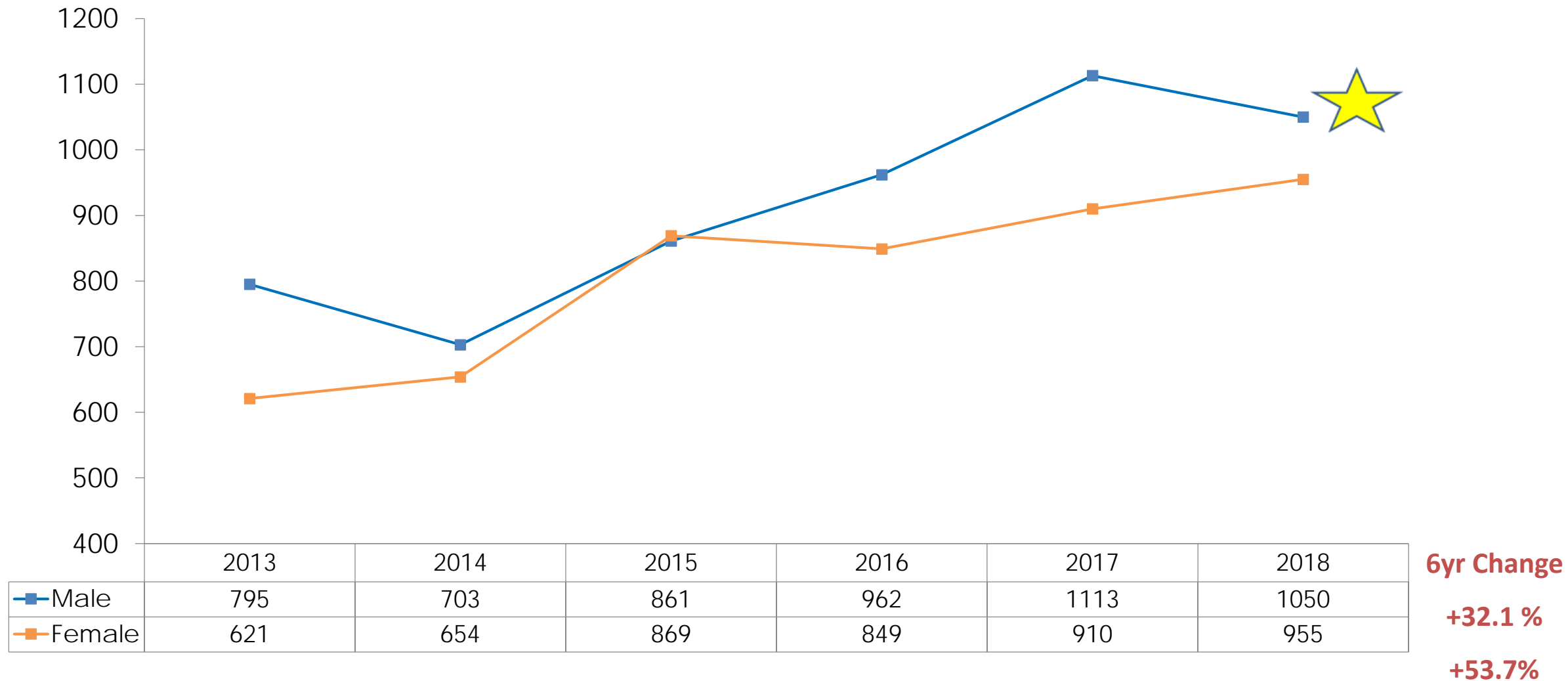

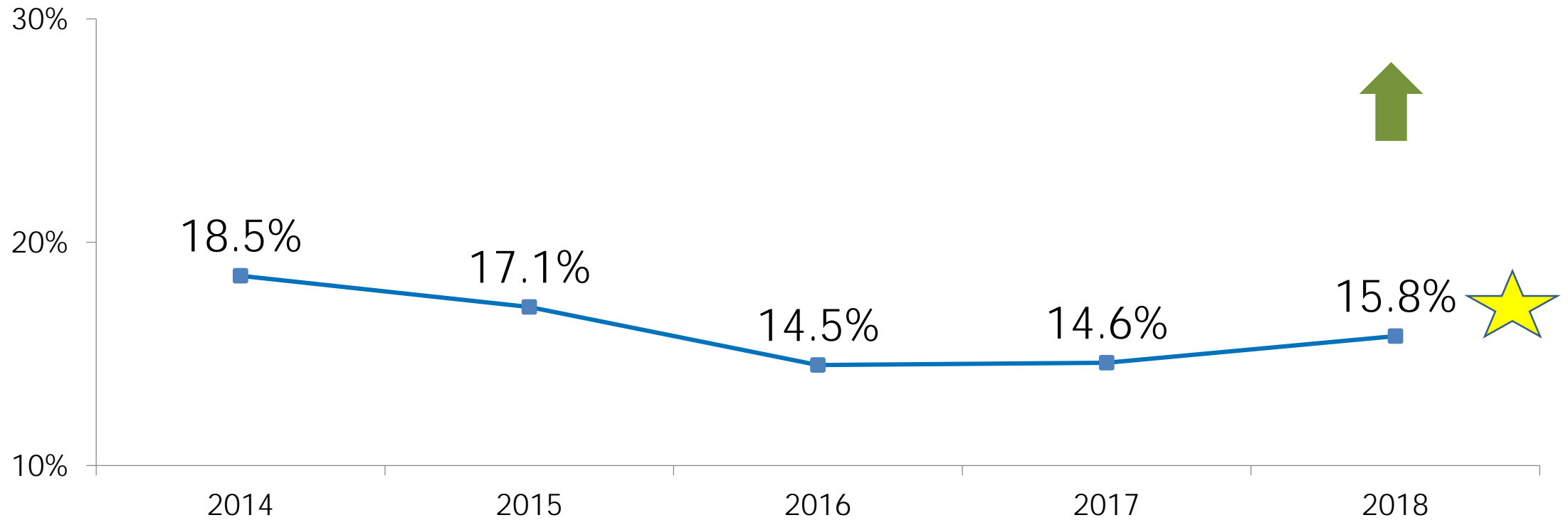

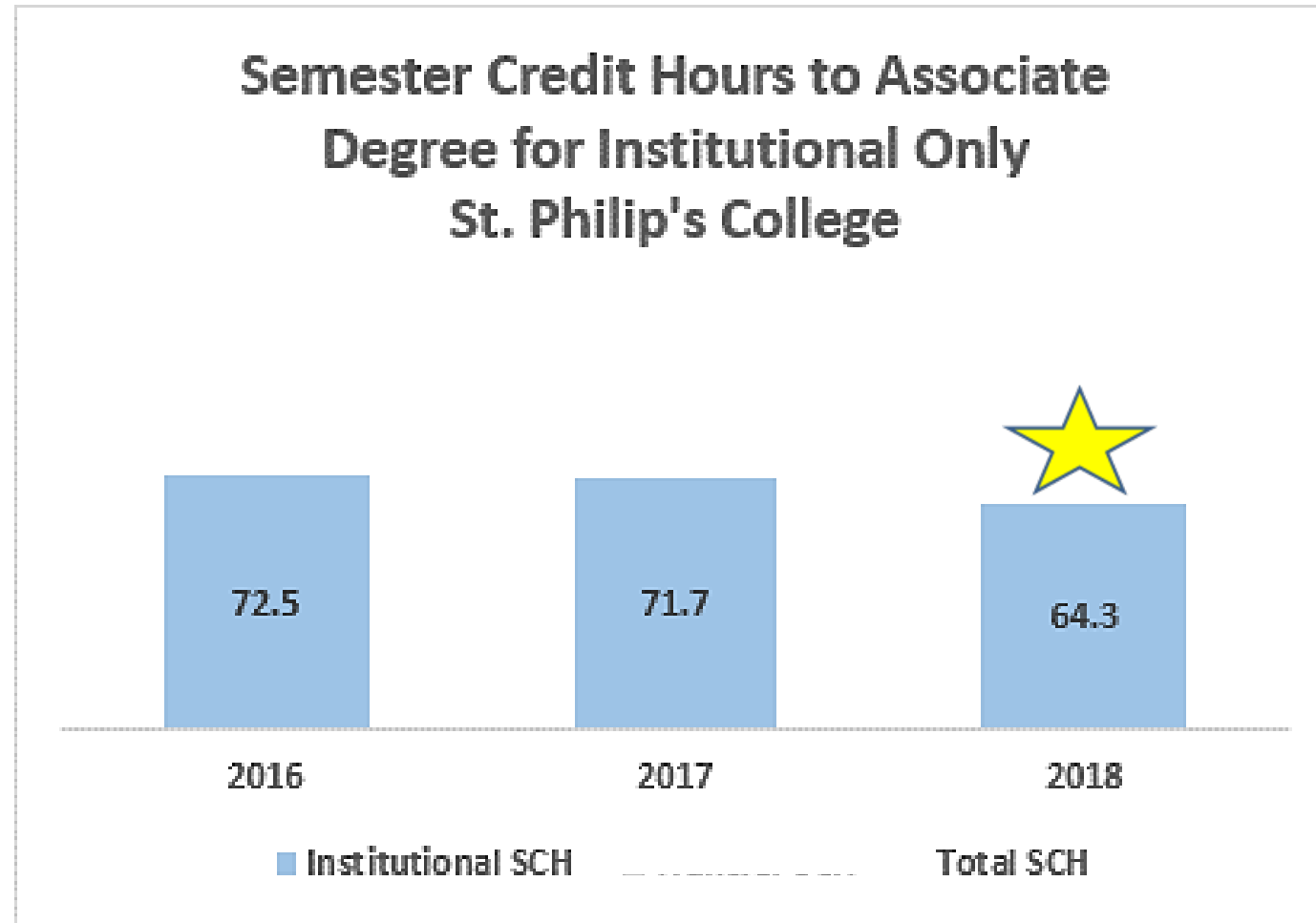

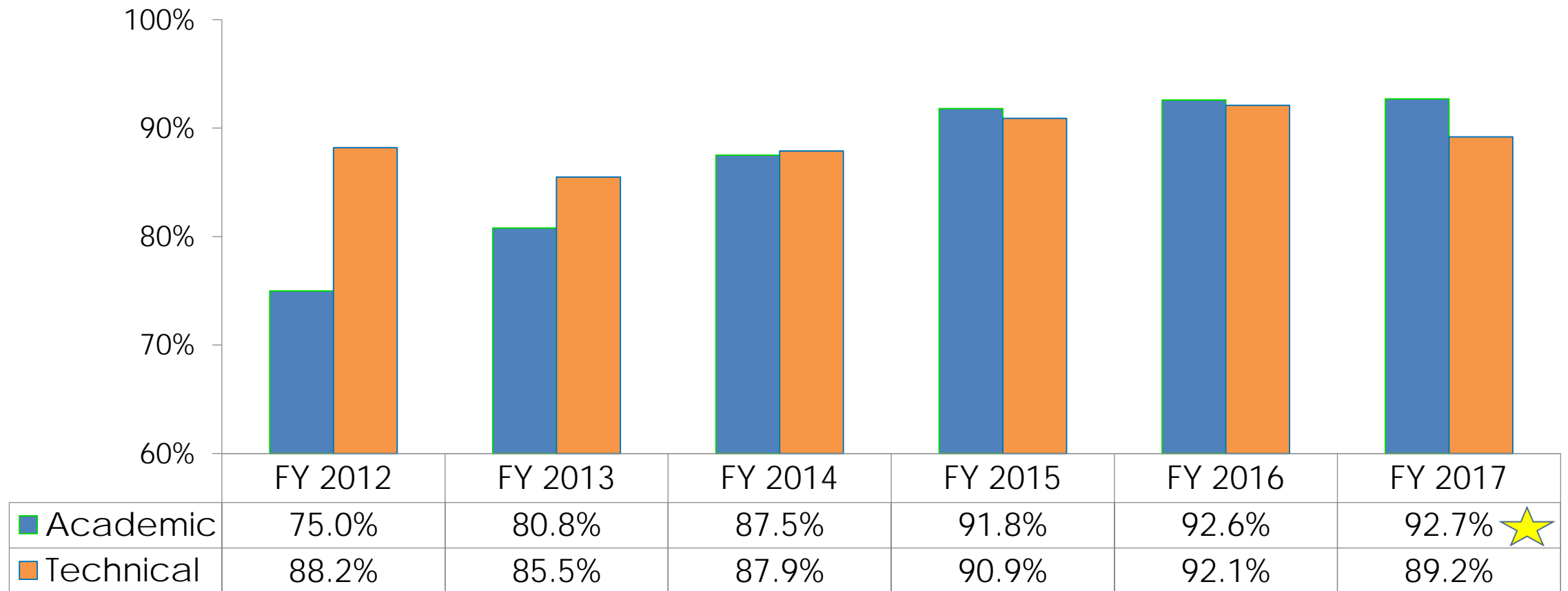

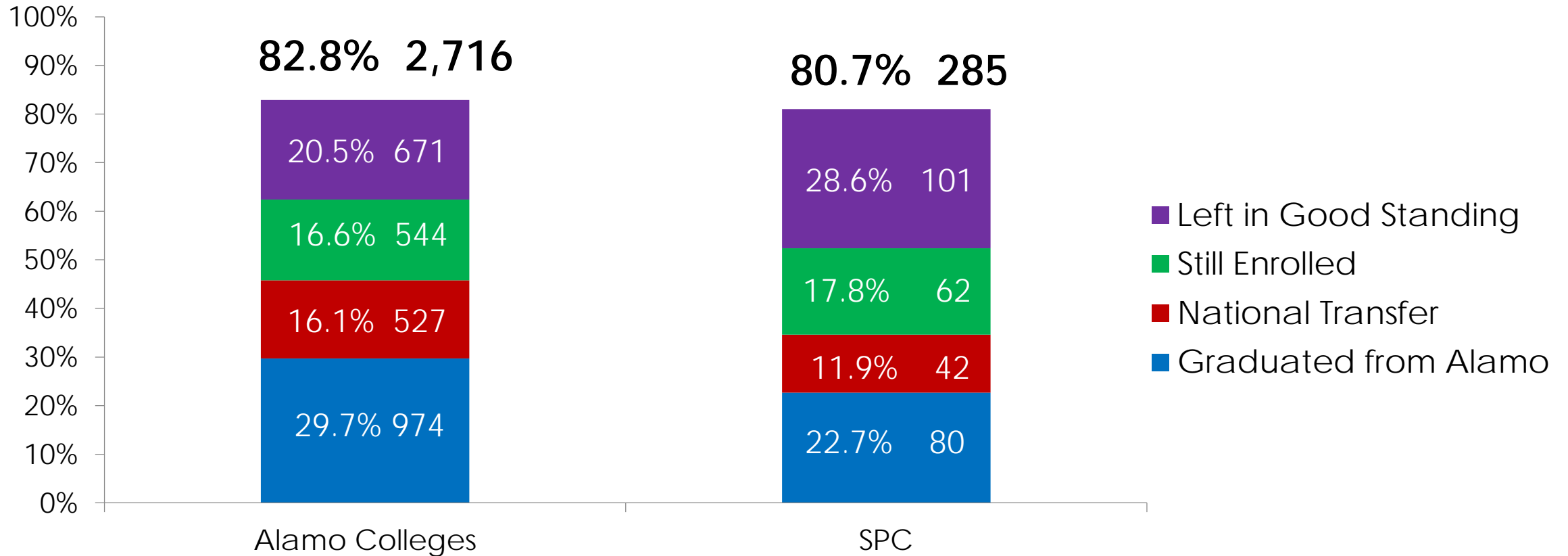
Semester Credit Hours to Associate Degree (Initial Associate Degree Only)



Students Employed and/or Enrolled Within 6 Months of Graduation



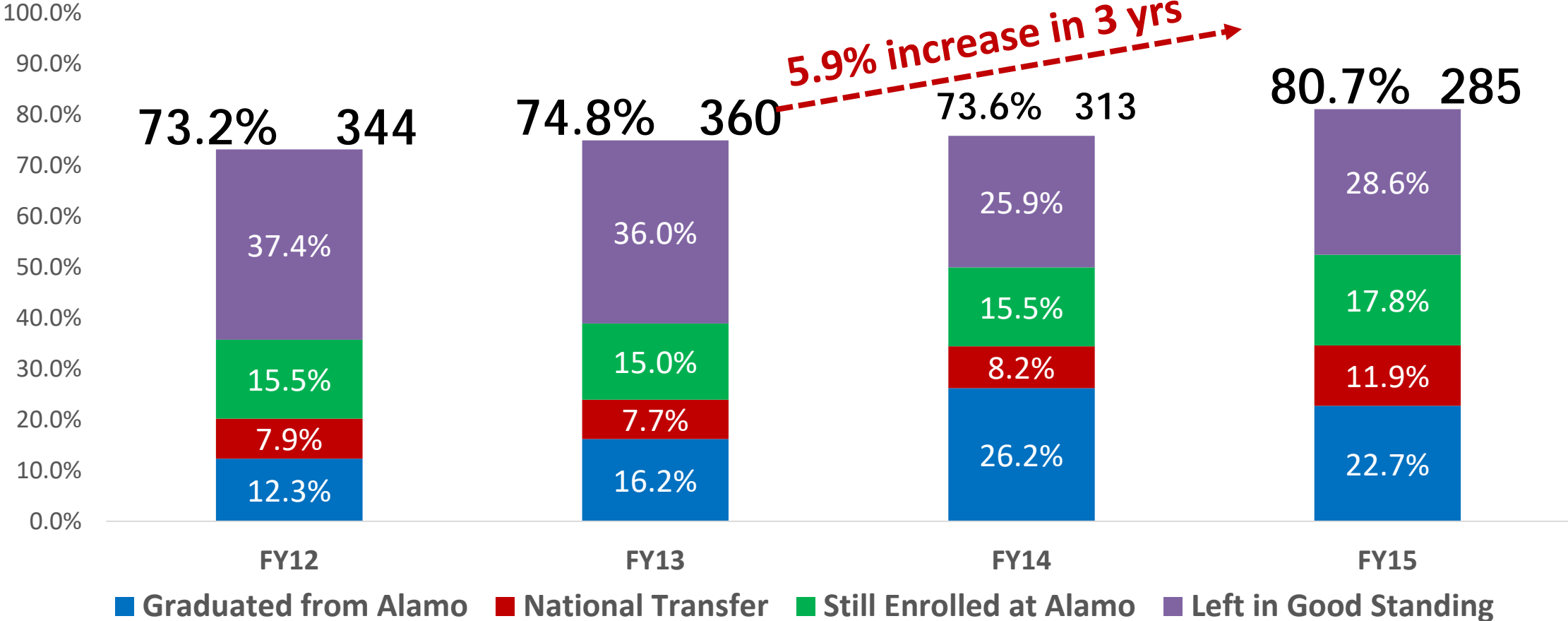

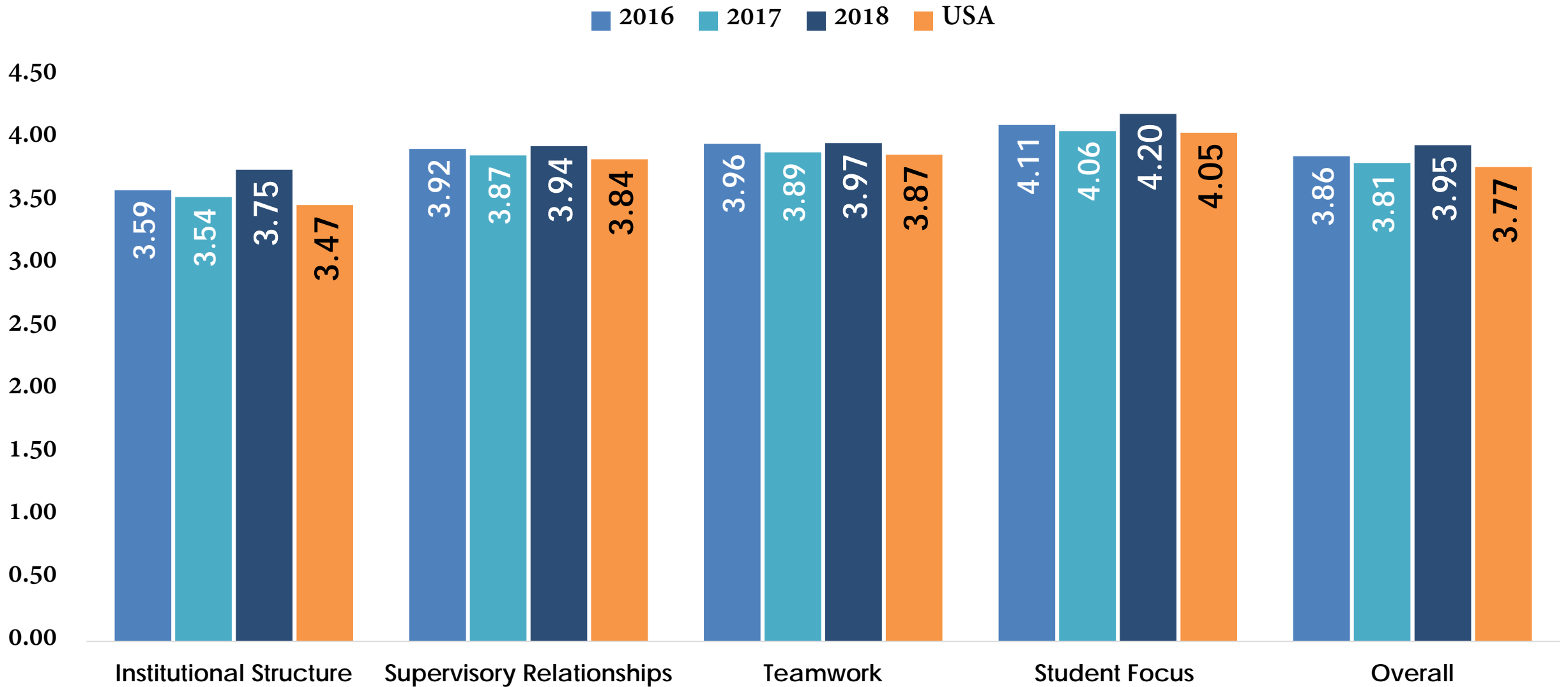

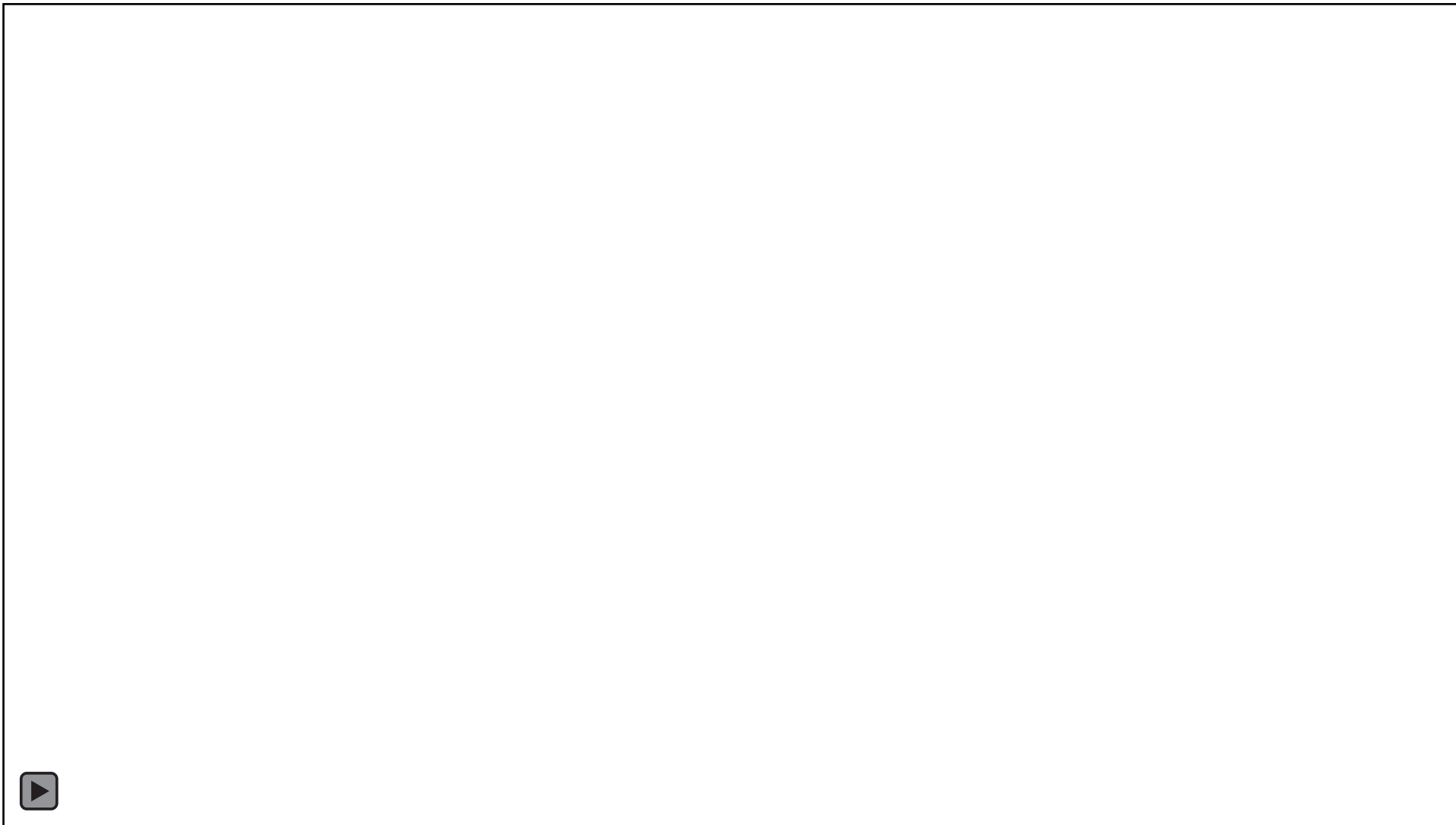

The Tourism, Hospitality, and Culinary Arts (THCA) Center for Excellence building will serve as a replacement building to the current program on the St. Philips campus. The existing THCA program currently utilizes approximately 18,000 sf of space (primarily the second level) of the existing Campus Center building. All THCA programs will be relocated into the new Center for Excellence building currently designed at approximately 61,800 GSF with the capacity to serve over 1,000 occupants.



The facility will include general instructional spaces, administrative offices, building common spaces, and teaching kitchens/classrooms related to culinary arts, tourism, and hospitality. Public functions include a café, pastry shop, and restaurant. Educational functions include a 75 seat lecture hall, classrooms, and teaching kitchens. Each kitchen comes with standard support spaces for food storage and kitchen cleaning. The building is planned as a four story structure with an open stair that will draw students and visitors from the two primary entrances on levels 1 and 2 all the way up to the Artemesia dining room that is cantilevered on level 4.

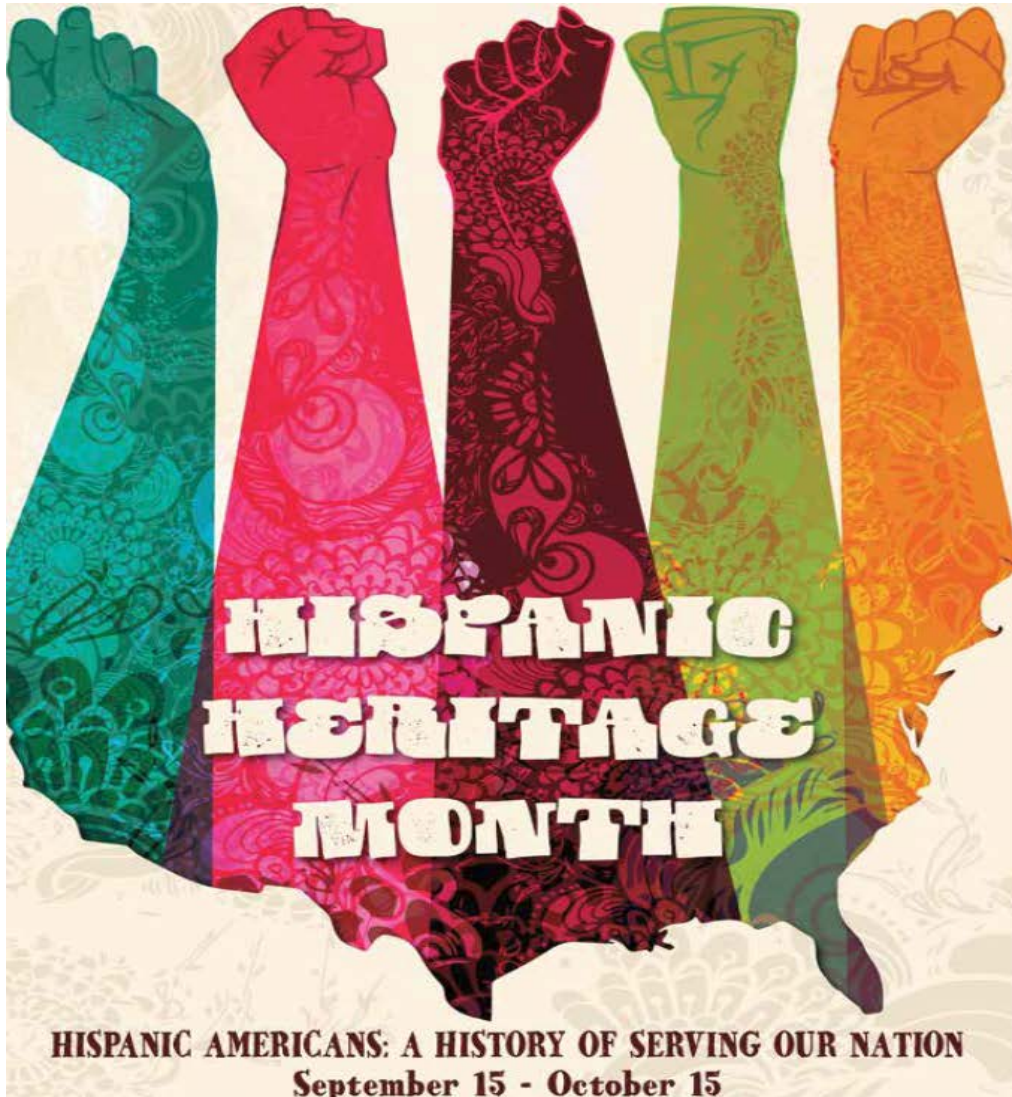
